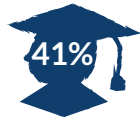

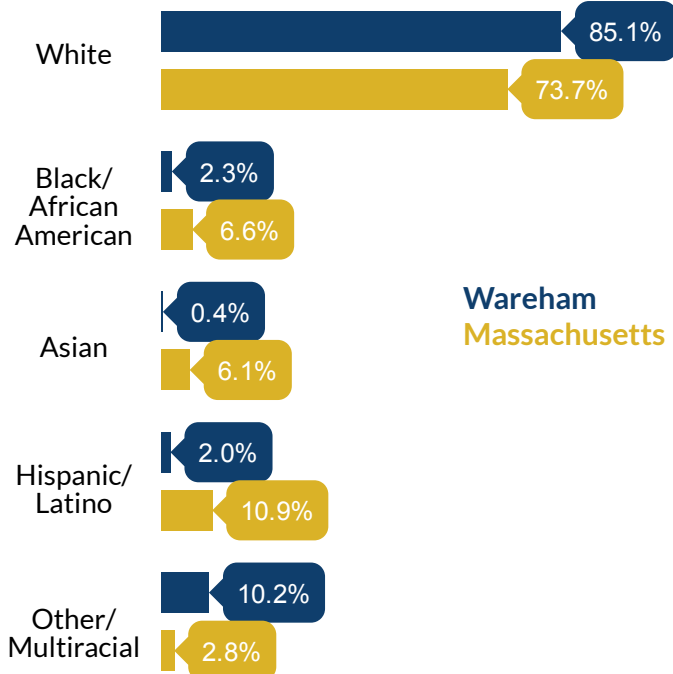

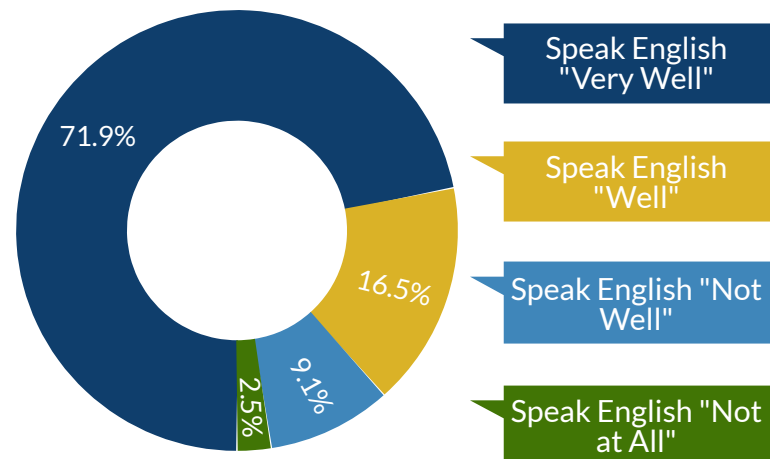

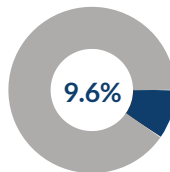

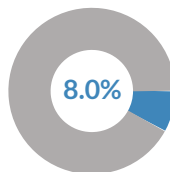

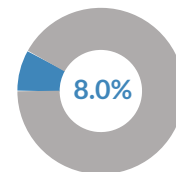


Individuals living below poverty level.

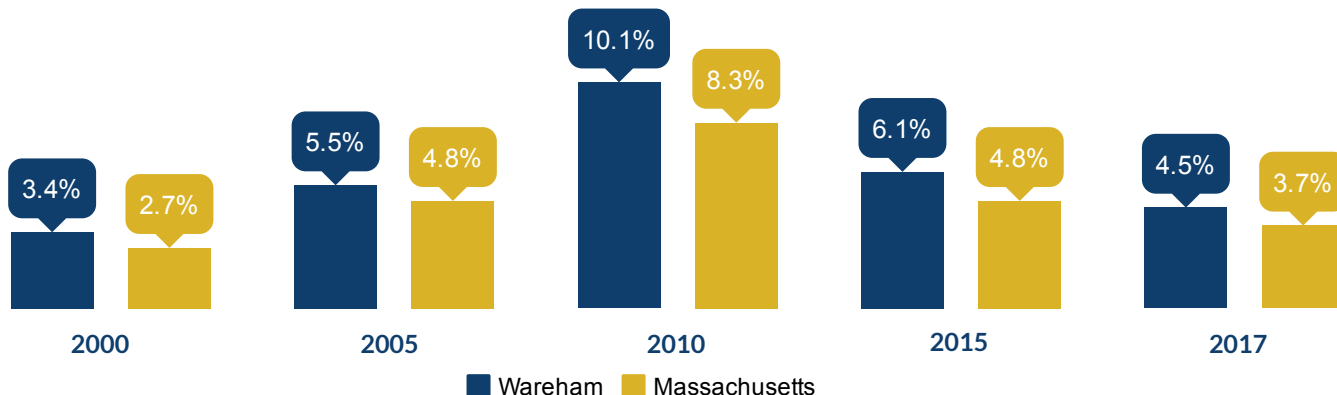


Families living below poverty level.

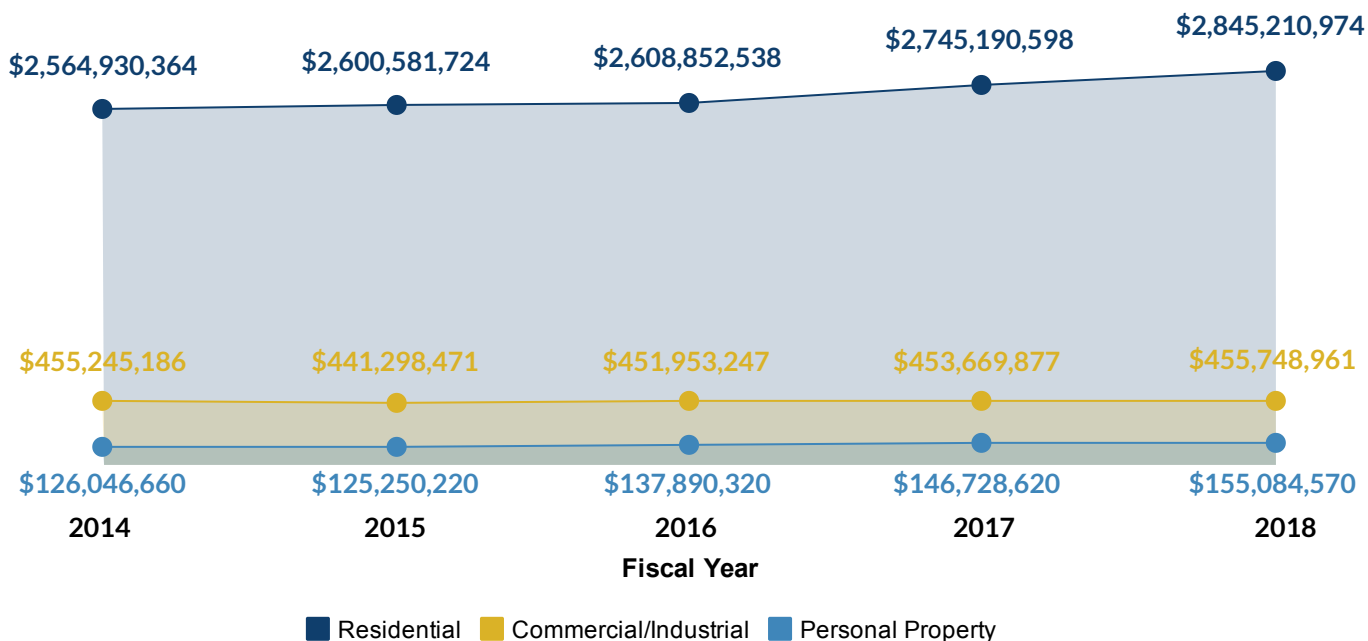

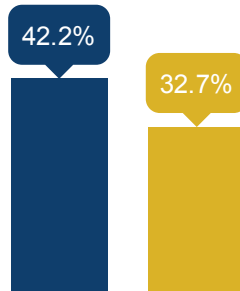

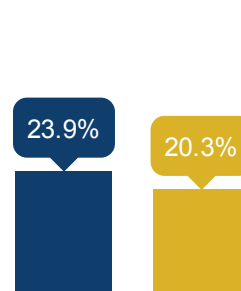
Housing-Cost Burden

Housing-cost burden is defined by the U.S. Census Bureau as "30 percent or more of income spend on housing-costs."

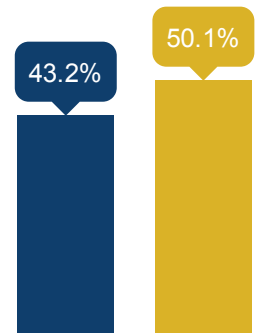
Among Homeowners with Mortgages

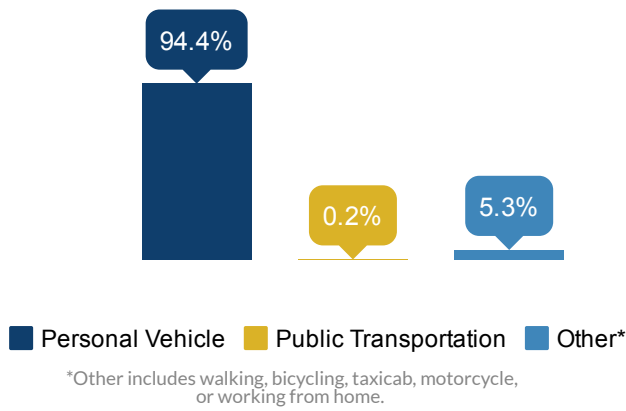

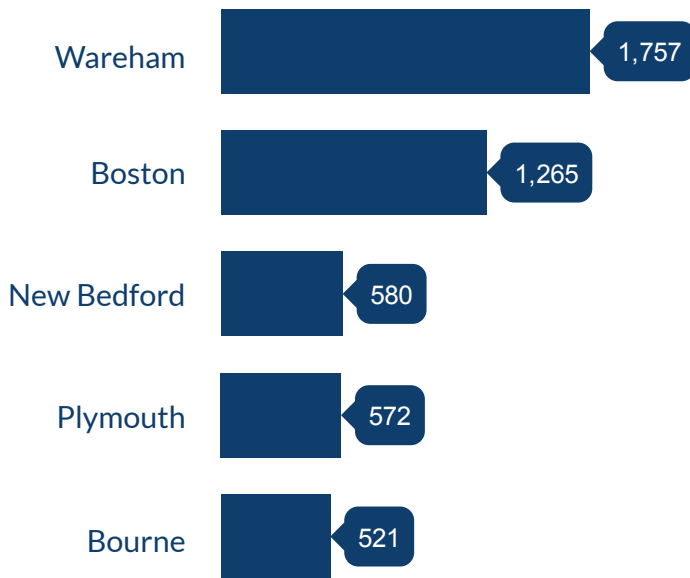

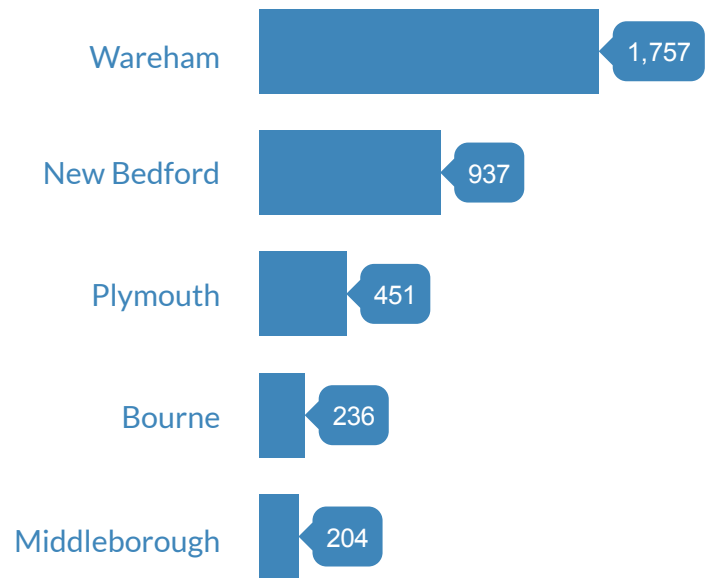

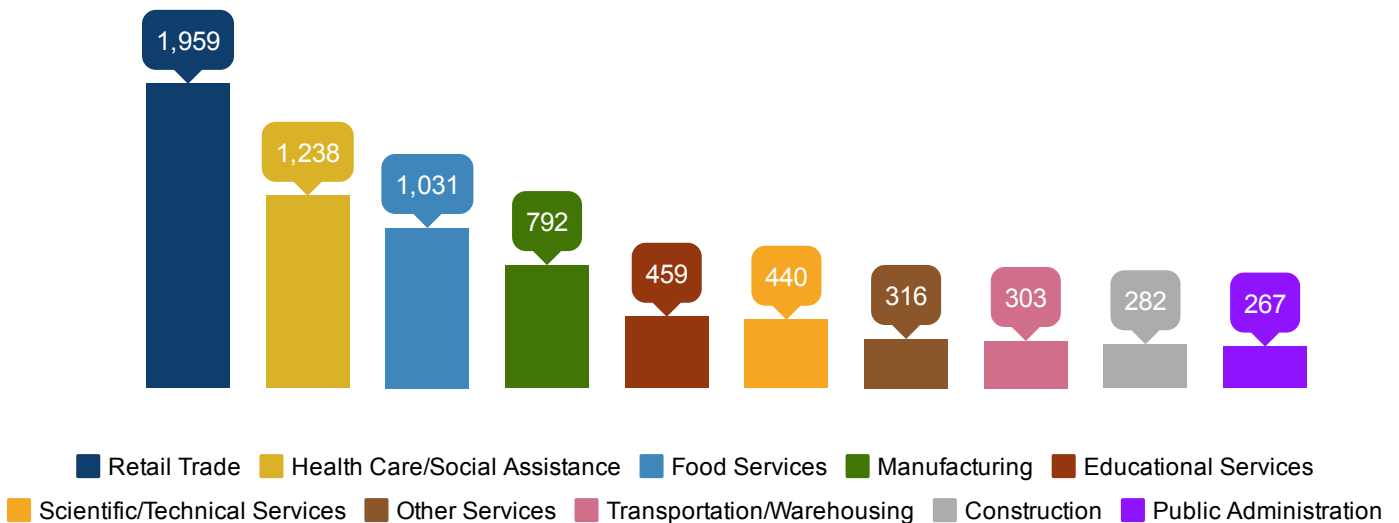
Top Five Communities in which Wareham Residents Work

Top Ten Industries in which Wareham Workers are Employed

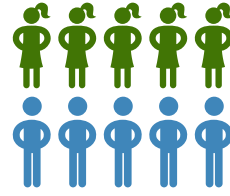

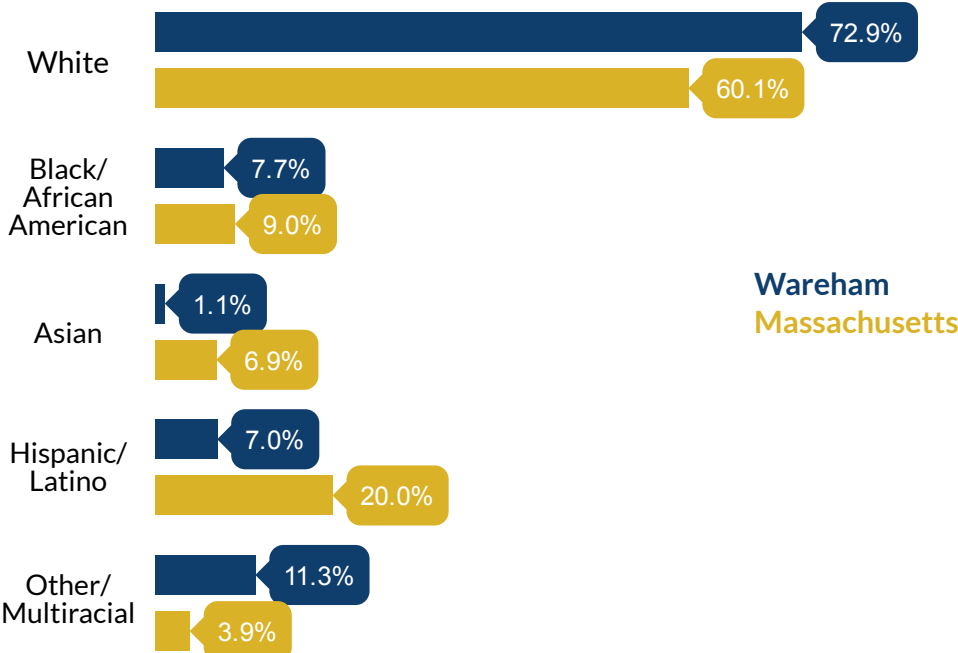

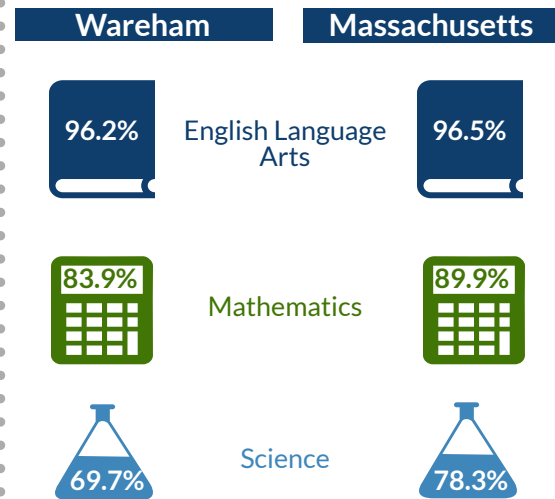

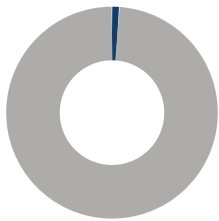
Student Race & Ethnicity 2017-18



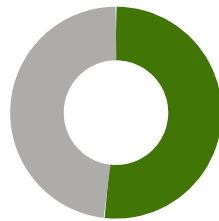
Composite Performance Index (2017)



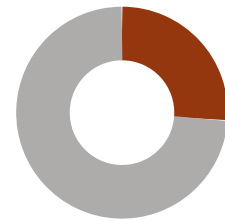

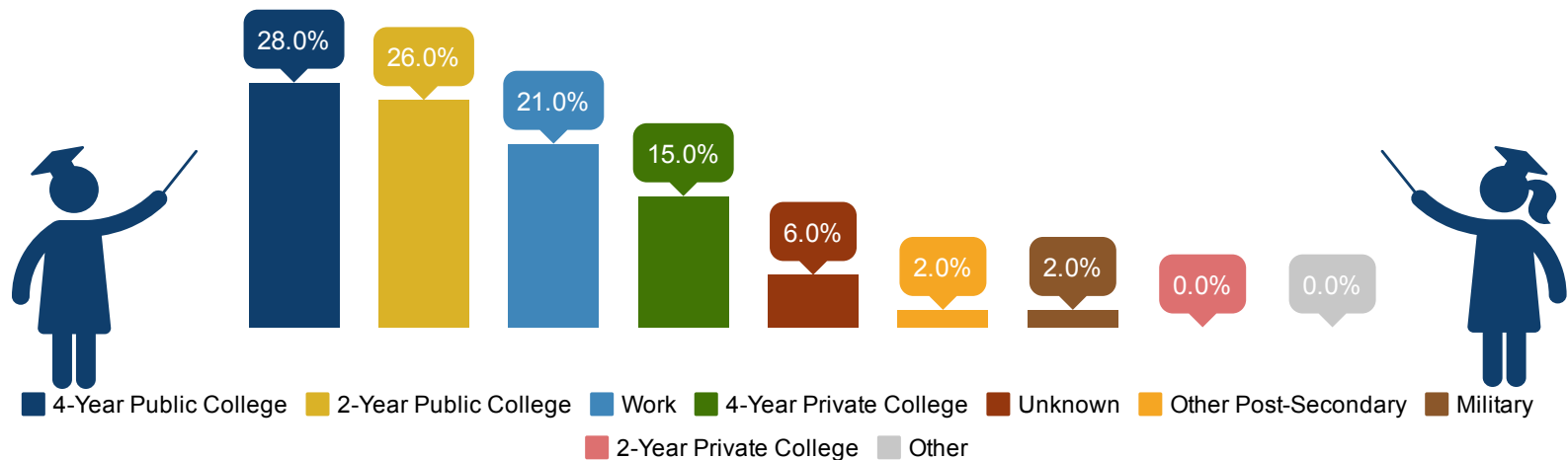

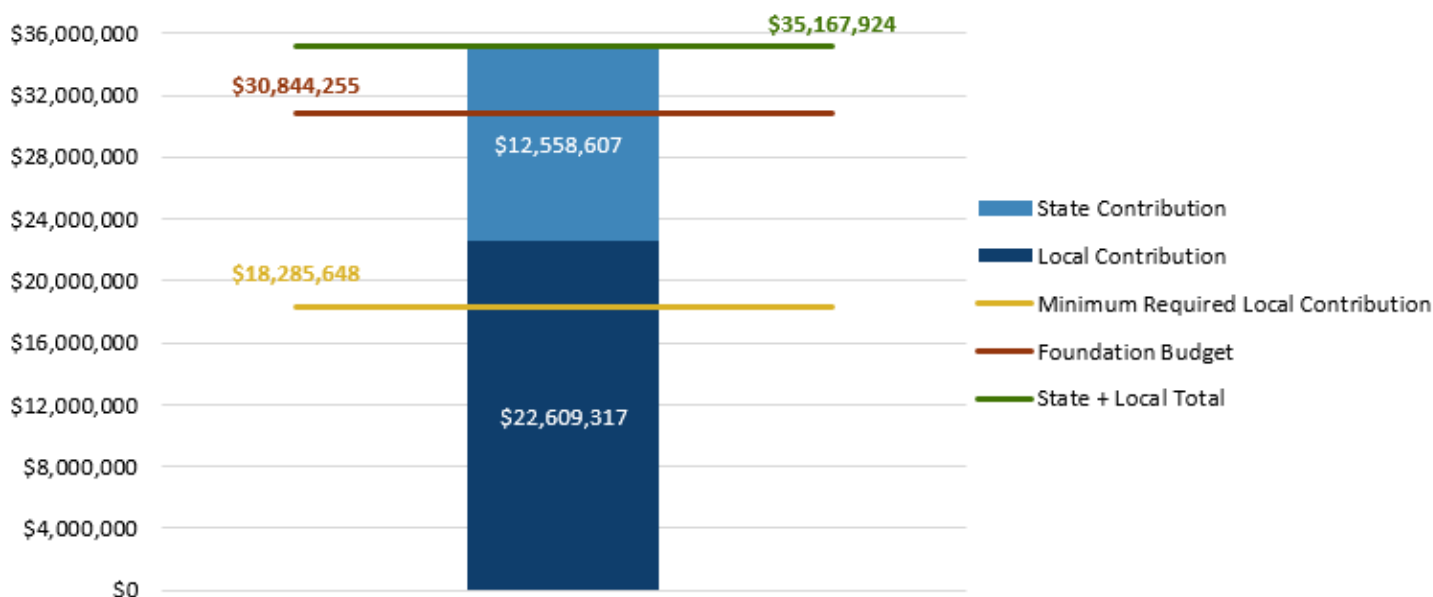

Glossary

Composite Performance Index (CPI):

- Massachusetts uses the 100-point Composite Performance Index (CPI) to measure progress towards the goal of narrowing proficiency gaps. The CPI assigns 100, 75, 50, 25, or 0 points to each student participating in PARCC, MCAS, and MCAS Alternate Assessment (MCAS-Alt) tests based on how close they came to scoring Proficient or Advanced. (For example, all students scoring Proficient or Advanced are assigned 100 CPI points; students with very low assessment scores are assigned 0 CPI points.) The CPI for a student group is calculated by dividing the total number of points by the number of students in the group. The result is a number between 0 and 100.

Economically Disadvantaged:

- Students who participate in one or more of the following state-administered programs: the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP); the Transitional Assistance for Families with Dependent Children (TAFDC); the Department of Children and Families' (DCF) foster care program; and MassHealth (Medicaid).

English Language Learners:

- Percentage of students whose first language is something other than English who is unable to perform ordinary classroom work.

Foundation Budget:

- The Foundation Budget is the minimum spend amount required by each district. This number includes Chapter 70 funding and the minimum amount required by each local district.

Graduation Rate Cohort:

- Students are assigned to graduation cohorts based on when they first enter grades 9-12 in a Massachusetts public school system. Once a student is assigned a particular cohort year (e.g., 2011), the student's cohort never changes. The cohort graduation rate is calculated by dividing the number of students who graduate within four or five years by the total number in the cohort.

- The cohort includes transfers in and transfers out.

Non-Grad Completers:

- Includes students who earned a certificate of attainment, students who met local graduation requirements but the district does not offer certificates of attainment, and students with special needs who reached the maximum age (22) but did not graduate.

Poverty Rates and Thresholds:

- Poverty status for families is based on the income levels of the householder. In the United States, the poverty thresholds are as follows: (adjusted to 2015 dollars)

- 1 person household: \$12,083
- 2 person household: \$15,394
- 3 person household: \$18,869
- 4 person household: \$24,254
- 5 person household: \$28,724
- 6 person household: \$32,505
- 7 person household: \$36,964
- 8 person household: \$41,009
